1. READING OF NOTICE CONVENING THE CONGRESS

1.1 The Executive Director read the Notice convening the Congress.

1.2 The President declared open the Annual Congress of the Union and extended a welcome to all members present, especially welcoming Mrs. E. McLeod (Tas) and M. Finn (SA) to their first Congress.

1.3 The President welcomed Mr. Wally Fabiszewski of Sanyo Australia Ltd., to the Congress and Mr. Fabiszewski then addressed the Congress.

1.4 Mr. Fabiszewski was thanked by the President and was invited to attend the remainder of the Congress.

2. ADMISSION OF MEDIA REPRESENTATIVES

2.1 It was resolved to admit press and broadcasting representatives to the Congress, subject to their not reporting the substance of any discussion held in camera, and to submitting for approval any statements on controversial issues.

3. PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

The last time that the Amateur Athletic Union of Australia met in Brisbane saw an historic step taken in amateur athletics in Australia. Both the Men's and Women's Unions became amalgamated and welded together in the one Union.

At that time a number of men and women, jealous of their own positions within their respective Unions respectively saw such amalgamation as a weakening and capitulation of their standing and authority.

However, those with the vision to improve the opportunity of all Australia's athletes whether they be men or women, saw such amalgamation as an opportunity to align amateur athletics in Australia with Australia of the 80's.

Since that time administration of athletics has undergone marked change. The Union has established a permanent professional staff which is unparalleled in amateur sport in Australia.

In combination with that staff the Board of the Union has been able to achieve goals that were previously not considered to be within the realms of amateur sport. It is perhaps a pity that some people who have not been able or prepared to keep up with the changes seek to criticise rather than support the efforts of others who endeavour to advance amateur athletics in Australia.

The importance of amateur sport to the public of our Society is reflected in the recent decision of the Australian Government in its preparedness to commit itself to large future financial expenditure in support of this Union's application to host the World Cup in 1985.

This project must be approached with confidence and endeavours for if we are successful in obtaining these Championships for our country we will furnish Australia with the opportunity to host a world championship which is unlikely to be equalled within the next decade.

In the short term this year, 1982, is very important for athletics in Australia. The Commonwealth Games to be held in Brisbane will give our athletes the opportunity to compete against the World's finest athletes within our own shores. It is to be hoped that the hard work of very many men and women in preparation for these Games will not be frustrated by the political intents and ambitions of others.

One can only look forward to the day when some politicians of the world find a vehicle other than sport on which to display their views and ideals. This is not to suggest that many of the causes exposed through sport are not worthy of world attention but the fact that some countries will use sport to achieve the same rather than other sanctions seems to me to be a poor way to achieve worthy and worthwhile events.

Sport and the fair participation in the same must be seen by the world as a way to unite and bond nations together rather than divide them.

It is to be hoped that the problems that appear to presently beset the Commonwealth Games can be overcome with wisdom so that they may be a successful gathering of all Commonwealth countries and thereby give example to the world. The selfish ambitions of a few should not be permitted to suppress the aspirations and hopes of many.

The Games will give our athletes the opportunity to show whether the investment that has been made in their achievement has been beneficial.

I am fairly of the view that for Australian athletes to succeed they must be prepared to compete as hardened, tested and tried athletes. Gone is the day when an athlete was able to "set" himself for one event and hope to succeed. The athlete who succeeds today is the athlete who has learnt by hard international competition to compete, survive and succeed

against the world's best. This must be learnt by athletes and coaches alike. The task of this Union is to give that opportunity to the athletes. If they wish to represent Australia they must take advantage of the opportunity and show selectors that they can adequately represent Australia in the international field.

We are in an exciting era as far as athletics is concerned in Australia. It is to be hoped that we can work together as officials and athletes can take advantage of every opportunity presented so that we may show the world that the opportunities and the way of life in Australia are as good as any in the world.

4. READING AND CONFIRMATION OF THE MINUTES OF THE 1981 HALF-YEARLY CONGRESS.

4.1 It was resolved that the Minutes of the 1981 Half-yearly Congress be adopted as a true record.

5. BUSINESS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES OF THE 1981 HALF-YEARLY CONGRESS

5.1 Minute 13.7.1 It was noted that on the list of records on page 33 of the above minutes, the a 50 mile open record for men should be included and the women's open pentathlon should be deleted.

5.2 Minute 17.29 It should be noted that the intention of this Rule 7.1.4 is to conduct a 50 kilometres for men and 10 kilometres for women annually instead of biennially.

5.3 Minute 17.30 Discussion of this matter was deferred until the second day of the Congress, after submission had been put to the Secretaries' Meeting by the Secretary of the Union.

5.4 Minute 8.2.2 It was noted that as soon as present stocks of medals are depleted, the Union will revert to a medal without the laurel wreath on the reverse side of the medal.

6.1.4 Honorary Statistician: Mr. P. Jenes (Vic) was elected unopposed to the office of Statistician.

6.1.5 Board of Management: Nominations were received for M.R. Aitken (SA), G.T. Briggs (Tas), Mrs. G. Chester (WA), Mrs. W. Ey (SA), G. James (Qld), Dr. F.P. Larkins (Vic), C.D. Lee (NSW), Mrs. E.Y. 6.1.7 Scoring Tables & Standards Committee: Nominations were received for R. Hood (Tas), R. Morris (Tas), N. Ruddock (Tas), R. Johnson (WA), D. Mercer (WA), N. Stanton (WA). Messrs. R.K. Hood, R.E. Morris and N.J. Ruddock were elected. Convenor N.J. Ruddock.

6.1.10 Constitution Committee: There being only three nominations, the following were elected: Dr. F.P. Larkins (Vic), Mrs. M. Robinson (Vic), Dr. I. Jones (Vic). Convenor Dr. I. Jones. The thanks of the Congress was extended to the Constitution Committee for the work done by it's members on behalf of the Union.

6.2 Merit Award: Nominations were received for D.G. Ferrier (Vic), J.D. Forrest (Qld), Mrs. D. Frawley (Tas), Mrs. R. Frith (NSW), Mrs. A. Kelly (NSW), Miss M. Patterson (Vic). As no nomination received a three-fourths majority of votes of the Congress no Merit Award was made for 1982.

6.3 Life Member: Nominations were received for Mrs. G. Chester (WA), C.D. Lee (NSW), Mrs. E.Y. McMinn (Qld), Mrs. F. Wrighter (NSW). As no nomination received a three-fourths majority of votes of the Congress no Life Membership Award was awarded for 1982.

6.4 Trustees:

6.4.1 Union: Messrs. A.W. McDonald (Vic) and M.R. Aitken (SA) were elected Trustees of the Union.

6.4.2 R.W. Clarke Foundation: Messrs. A.W. McDonald (Vic) and M.R. Aitken (SA) were elected trustees of the R.W. Clarke Foundation.

6.4.3 Alf Robinson Memorial Foundation Race Walking: Messrs. A.W. McDonald (Vic), M.R. Aitken (SA) and Miss M. Patterson (Vic) were elected as Trustees of the above Foundation.

7. REPORTS

7.1 Board of Management Report: (Appendix 1)

7.1.1 It was resolved that this Report be received.

7.1.2 Item 3 Discussion on item 3 was held in camera and it was resolved that the negotiations entered into by the Secretary and the Board of Management be endorsed and that the Secretary and the President be authorised to conclude arrangements to achieve the end that has been reported to the Congress.

7.1.2.1 The President expressed the appreciation of the Union to Mr. Lee and Mr. Pannell in relation to the above involvement.

7.1.3 Item 5 It was resolved that the Secretary be directed to write to Mr. A. Hodsdon thanking him for all his time spent in packing the records of the Union and also congratulating him on his 80th birthday and 50th wedding anniversary.

7.1.3.1 The thanks of the Congress were extended to Miss Neville and Messrs. Gardiner & Schubert for their offer to sort and file the above material.

7.1.4 Item 6 It was resolved that Miss Gael Mulhall be eligible for domestic competition as from 1st August, 1982.

7.1.5 Item 7 It was resolved that the Congress record its thanks to Mr. John Marshall for his work to date in relation to the World Cup Application.

7.1.6 Item 8 It was resolved to defer this matter until after the Secretaries' Meeting.

7.2 Secretary's Report (Appendix 2)

7.2.1 It was resolved that the Secretary's Report be received.

7.2.2 It was resolved that the records (with amendments) be approved subject to it being clarified that Hans Lotz qualifies residentially and subject to investigating the Junior 400m for men.

7.2.3 It was resolved that the reinstatements as competing athletes as follows be forwarded to the IAAF for approval: F. Grubb (Vic), A. Salter (Vic), D. Cain (Vic), P. Ship (Vic), R. Larkings (NSW).

7.3 Treasurer's Report (Appendix 3)

7.3.1 The Secretary read the Treasurer's Report and Auditor's letter.

7.3.2 It was resolved that the balance sheet, statement of income and expenditure and auditor's letter be received.

7.3.3 It was resolved that the matters raised by the auditor as to invoices and payments be referred to the Treasurer to implement appropriate procedures and report to the Board.

7.3.3.1 It was resolved that the amount of \$16 relating to the Olympic Team, at present in a suspense account, be written out of the General Ledger.

7.3.3.2 It was resolved that the balance of \$390.40 relating to the national Coaching Clinic Account be written off to accumulated funds.

7.3.3.3 The matter of depreciation was noted.

7.3.4 It was resolved that an honorarium of \$450 be paid to the former Treasurer and that the thanks of Congress be extended to Mr. Sumner for his services to the Union over the last 10 years.

7.4 Executive Director's Report (Appendix 4)

7.4.1 It was resolved that the report be received with an amendment being made to the last paragraph of page 2. This should read "The book will contain a complete list of all Australian athletes in the athletic team section at Olympic and Commonwealth Games, including performances.

7.4.2 It was noted that the Western Australian Association wish to become involved in the Mars 5 Star Award Scheme.

7.4.3 It was noted that discussion on travel would take place at the meeting of Secretaries.

7.5 Coaching Director's Report (Appendix 5)

7.5.1 The report was received and adopted with the recommendation that the emphasis for assistance be placed on A Squad members for 1982.

7.6.1.1 It was resolved that the above report be referred to the Coaching Co-ordinating Committee to make recommendations to the Board.

7.6.2 Report of the Delegate to the Confederation of Australian Sport

7.6.2.1 It was resolved that this report be received and that the thanks of the Congress be extended to Mrs. Ey together with congratulations on her election to the Confederation for the next two years.

7.6.3 Report of Delegates to the Australian Commonwealth Games Association.

7.6.3.1 It was resolved that the report be received.

7.6.3.2. It was noted that the closing date for team nominations was now 6th September, 1982.

7.7 Report of Officials Committee

7.7.1 It was resolved that the report be received.

7.7.2 It was resolved that a vote of thanks be extended to Mrs. F. Wrighter for the work done by her on behalf of the Union.

7.7.3 It was noted that the examination papers had been received from South Australia since the compilation of the report.

7.7.4 It was also noted that the first level one examinations would be held from 20 - 27 November and that cards were being printed for people who had passed examinations or had been exempted from examinations.

7.8.2 It was resolved to re-affirm the Union's endeavours to have a 5K walk for men and women on the Pacific Conference Games programme.

7.8.3 It was resolved that the views of the Convenor of the Walking Committee as to a 5K for men and women be taken into consideration with the programming for Alcoa meetings or the like.

7.8.4 It was resolved that the Union draws to the attention of the Manager of the Australian Championships and the Referee of those Championships of the undesirability of their being a practice that before the commencement of the walking races, the rules and procedures are explained to the competitors on the track.

State Associations were encouraged to send teams if possible.

- 7.20 It was resolved to re-affirm the policy of the Union that all standing committees submit minutes of meetings to the Union so as to enable copies of such minutes to be circulated to Member Associations.
- 7.21 Reports of Team Managers
- 7.21.1 Lugano & Eschborn Trophies, Spain - Manager John Boas
- 7.21.1.1 It was resolved that the report be received.
- 7.21.1.2 The Congress was advised that the recommendations contained in this report has been dealt with by the Board of Management via Mrs. Mahony and the relevant action taken.
- 7.21.2 Australian Multiple Event Team, Christchurch - Manager Alan Launder
- 7.21.2.1 It was resolved that the report be received.
- 7.21.2.2 Recommendation 1. That the multi event competition be held annually on a home and away basis.
- 7.21.2.2.1 It was resolved that this recommendation be accepted as such and endorsed by the Congress.
- 7.21.2.3 Recommendation 2. That it be a true team competition with three to compete and two to score in each group, i.e. senior and junior men and women.
- 7.21.2.3.1 This recommendation was accepted subject to negotiations with the New Zealand Amateur Athletic Association.
- 7.21.2.4 Recommendation 3. That it be given full status and athletes NOT be expected to pay \$200 towards the cost of the trip. If this meeting became an annual one, State Associations might be asked to contribute to help fund their athletes.
- 7.21.2.4.1 It was resolved that this matter be raised under funding for international teams.
- 7.21.2.5 Recommendation 4. That on future trips the team should stay together in a hotel and not be billeted. While there are advantages in billeting, the travelling team loses a great opportunity to interact, learn from each other and build team spirit.
- 7.21.2.5.1 It was resolved that this recommendation be noted for future consideration.
- 7.21.2.6 Recommendation 5. Agreement be reached with the New Zealand Association that junior athletes use senior implements and senior hurdles to ensure that all performances are valid. On this trip the New Zealanders insisted on using their junior shot and discus and their 2'6" hurdles. This of course distorts the scoring tables.

7.21.2.6.1 It was resolved that the New Zealand Association should be advised that there is no such thing as a multiple event competition which does not use weights and heights as laid down by the IAAF and Australia would see no purpose in continuing this match if this is not adhered to.

7.21.2.7 Recommendation 6. That athletes be surveyed 6 - 8 weeks ahead as to their availability and teams plus substitutes be selected and prepared, (passports/uniforms, etc.) for the trip as early as possible. The same of course to apply to team manager/coaching positions.

7.21.2.7.1 It was resolved that this recommendation be received.

7.21.2.8 It was resolved that the Secretary should write to all Member Associations drawing their attention to the fact that in heptathlon and decathlon events, whether for juniors or otherwise, the implements, distances and heights are those as laid down by the IAAF.

7.21.2.9 It was resolved that the Coaching Director should look at distances, etc., for multiple events and make any recommendations deemed necessary

7.22 Reports on National Championships conducted

7.22.1 1981 Marathon and Road Walking Championships - Victoria

7.22.1.1 It was resolved that the report be received.

7.22.1.2 It was noted that the Northern Territory has a new Secretary and it was expected that they would shortly make application to be a member association of the Union.

7.22.2 Comsteel All Schools Track & Field Championships - Queensland

7.22.2.1 It was resolved that the report be received.

7.22.2.2 It was resolved that the Secretary should write to the Queensland Associations expressing the disappointment of the Union in the manner in which the All Schools Track & Field Championships were conducted.

7.22.2.3 It was resolved that the matter of the size of the Schools Track & Field Team should be referred to the Standards Committee and that Mrs. Ey and the Coaching Director should implement some policy so as to keep control of this meeting. This policy should be presented to the next meeting of the Board of Management.

7.22.3 1981 Schools Cross Country Championship - Tasmania

7.22.3.1 It was resolved that the report be received.

7.22.4 1981 Cross Country Championship - South Australia

7.22.4.1 The Congress was advised that no report was available on the above Championship.

7.22.5 It was resolved that in future Member Associations should ensure that financial statements form part of all reports.

8. CORRESPONDENCE

8.1 AAA of NSW re addition of Joanne Sweetman to Championships.

8.1.1 It was resolved that Miss Sweetman not be permitted to enter into the Women's High Jump competition at the 1982 Australian Championships.

8.2 Robert de Castella re exemption from Selection Trial for Commonwealth Games Marathon.

8.2.1 The Congress was informed that it was the prerogative of the President to exclude any athlete from Trials and the President stated that he had exempted Robert de Castella from the above Trial but it would be emphasised to him that he would be required to prove his fitness before the event and he would not automatically be included in the Team for the Commonwealth Games.

8.3 AA of WA re Department of Home Affairs - Athlete Award Scheme

8.3.1 The Secretary advised the Congress that he had submitted the names of 12 people for the above scheme and 5 people were finally selected by the Department as recipients of the Award.

9. MOTIONS UPON NOTICE

9.1 Rule 1.2.2 (Item 1) Submitted by the Secretary that the Rule be amended by deleting the 1st sentence and replaced with the following: "With The exception of Schools Championships, each entry Australian Championships shall be accompanied by an entry fee, the amount of which shall be determined from time to time by the Board". The Rule would read:

Rule 1.2.2 Entries for all championship events shall be in writing on a form prescribed by the Union and shall close, in the case of all Track and Field Championships and in the case of any other championship with the Secretary of the host associations eighteen days before the proposed date of the first day of the Championship meeting unless a shorter period is specified by such association. All entries shall state the date of birth. With the exception of Schools Championships, each entry for Australian Championships shall be accompanied by an entry fee, the amount of which shall be determined from time to time by the Board."

An amendment was put to add the following words to the last sentence "and shall be refunded in the event of the competitor competing in all rounds of competition for which he/she is eligible."

The amendment was lost.

The motion was lost.

9.2 Rule 3.4.1 (Item 2) Submitted by the Secretary that the Rule be amended by inserting the following words after "three months": "or in the cases of the decathlon and the heptathlon eighteen months". The Rule would read:

Rule 3.4.1 Each association shall be entitled to be represented by one competitor in each event. An association may enter additional competitors provided all such entrants have reached a prescribed standard in the events concerned within three months or in the cases of the decathlon and the heptathlon eighteen months prior to the closing date of entries for the championships. The standard shall be determined by the Scoring Tables and Standards Committee of the Union and performances shall be certified in writing by the relevant association.

The motion was carried.

9.3 Rule 4.1.4 (Item 3) Submitted by the AAA of SA that the Rule be amended as follows: Table 4.1 In column "Maximum Number in Team" for item "Cross Country Women Open" change 4 to 6 and for item Cross Country Women Junior change 4 to 5 and for item Cross Country Women Sub Junior change 4 to 5.

An amendment was put to change the "Minimum Number in Team" for Cross Country Women Open from 3 to 4 and the number of team members to count be amended from 3 to 4. The amendment was carried.

The motion as amended was carried.

9.3.1 On the recommendation of the Constitution Committee in the interests of consistency the following motion was also adopted:

"In Table 6.1 for the 10,000m for Women the Minimum Number in Team be changed from 3 to 4 and the maximum number be changed from 4 to 6 and the Number of Team Members to Count for Points be changed from 3 to 4."

9.4 Rule 4.1 Table 4.1 and Rule 4.1.1 Table 5.1 and Rule 6.1 Table 6.1 (Item 4) Submitted by the AAA of NSW that the Rules be amended by changing the maximum number of team emergencies from 3 to 9.

The motion was carried.

9.5 Rule 10.1.10 (Item 5) Submitted by the Secretary on behalf of the Board of Management that the following new Rule be inserted:

Rule 10.1.10 IAAF 162 (9) - "Starting blocks which comply with the following specifications "must" be used for all races up to and including 400m (including the first leg of the 4 x 200m and 4 x 400m) and must not be used for any other race.

In addition to the Australian Track and Field Championships the foregoing dispensation does not apply to the Australian Schools Track and Field Championships and State Track and Field Championships.

An amendment was put to delete the second paragraph.

The amendment was carried.

The motion as amended was carried.

9.6 Rule 10.4.2 (Item 6) Withdrawn. This will be typed in full in final minutes.

10. AUSTRALIAN CHAMPIONSHIPS

10.1 Recapitulation of 1982 venues and dates.

10.1.1 It was resolved that the Secretary should write to the Tasmanian Government informing it that unless confirmation can be given that appropriate cover will be provided by the end of May, 1982, then the Australian Track & Field Championships not be held in Hobart in 1983.

10.2 Fixing date for 1983 and 1984 events.

10.2.1 It was resolved that Trials be held for the selection of the Lugano Cup Team.

10.2.2 It was resolved that the 1983 50K and 20K Walk Championships also be the Trials for the Lugano Cup Team.

10.2.2.1 A motion was put that these Championships and Trials be held in New South Wales.

The motion was carried.

10.2.2.2 A motion was put that the 50K and 20K Walk Championships of Australia be held in Perth in 1984.

The motion was carried.

10.2.3 It was resolved that this Congress recommend to the Board of Management that the 1984 Australian Track & Field Championships be held on 22nd - 25th March in Victoria, and the 1985 Australian Track & Field Championships be held in Canberra thus having the 1985 Championships as

a dress rehearsal for World Cup IV should Canberra be successful in its bid to hold the above competition.

10.3. It was resolved that Member Associations be requested to have any recommendations that they may have relating to the Under 18 Championships in the office of the Union no later than 1st May so that when the Board has its first meeting they can have those recommendations before them.

11. INTERNATIONAL COMPETITION

11.1 1982 Australia vs England. The Executive Director reported that some athletes would be extending this tour and that such athletes would be asked to contribute a sum of money to cover expenses. Expected departure date is June 5.

11.2 1982 European Tour. It was reported that this team would consist of: Women - Track & Field; Men - Field, and was expected to depart mid-July until the first week in August.

11.3 1982 Commonwealth Games

11.3.1 Mrs. Ey reported that she would be taking measurements of potential team members to enable uniforms to be expedited when the Team was finally selected.

11.3.2 Mr. Briggs reported that it seemed unlikely that the computer system would be working for the Australian Championships and that the first trial of the system would be the first day of competition for the Commonwealth Games.

11.3.3 Mr. Briggs also reported that the positions of officials was still unclear and the President undertook to clarify matters during the Australian Championships.

11.4 1982 Australia vs New Zealand Cross Country Competition

11.4.1 It was resolved that:

- (1) Australia should send a team to the above competition
- (2) The Executive Director be requested to draw up a budget as to the cost for the above competition in conjunction with the Treasurer
- (3) There should be deducted from the Budget the amount of any Government contribution, sponsorship or contribution from the Australian Olympic Federation
- (4) The remaining sum to be paid by the selected athletes

11.5 1982 Australia vs New Zealand Schools Track & Field

11.5.1 It was resolved that a Team should be sent to the above competition on the basis of athletes and officials finding their own funds.

11.6 1983 World Cross Country Championships.

11.6.1 It was resolved that the Executive Director should provide a budget for such team for consideration at the 1982 Half-Yearly Congress.

11.7 1983 World Championships

11.7.1 It was resolved to re-affirm the previous decision of Congress to send a Team to the 1983 World Championship.

11.7.2 It was resolved that the Board of Management should bring back to the 1982 Half-Yearly Congress a plan for raising money for teams for the next three years and this should be circularised at least 28 days prior to the Half-Yearly Congress.

11.8 1983 Lugano Cup

11.8.1 It was resolved to agree in principle to sending such a team but this would depend on funding available.

11.9 1983 Australia vs New Zealand Multiple Events Match

11.9.1 It was resolved that such event should be held at a date to be determined after communication with the New Zealand Amateur Athletic Association.

11.9.2 It was resolved to accept the offer of the Amateur Athletic Association of South Australia subject to the date being suitable to them and that the funding situation be similar to that of 1981.

11.10 Global Meetings

11.10.1 It was noted that the Board of Management had decided to go ahead with the above meetings for 1983 and that the matter of dates must be resolved by the Board, Global Sports Promotions and Member Associations.

12 GENERAL BUSINESS

12.1 It was resolved that the Selection Committee for Road Running and Cross Country be elected at the 1982 Half-Yearly Congress and the Secretary was directed to call for nominations accordingly. The Selection Committee as elected would be responsible for the selection of the World Cross Country Team.

12.2 It was noted that Member Associations' Constitutions would have to be amended regarding "eligibility" and the Constitution Committee should circulate all Associations with an approved amendment.

12.3 The President was presented with a set of medals which were used by the Tasmanian Amateur Athletic Association which is now disbanded.

12.4 The President thanked all Delegates, Life Members and others for their support during the Congress.

12.5 The President was thanked by Mrs. Wrighter on behalf of all present at the Congress for his able handling of the Congress.

The Congress closed at 11.50a.m.

THE AMATEUR ATHLETIC UNION OF AUSTRALIA (Appendix 1)

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

TO THE 1982 ANNUAL CONGRESS

1. The Board of Management met in Melbourne on the 15th & 16th November, 1981 and Canberra on 6th & 7th February, 1982.
2. Matters of immediate interest to Associations requiring their attention have been brought to notice in the course of the normal administrative procedures. A copy of the Minutes of the 19th & 20th Board of Management meetings have been distributed to all Associations.
3. "The Australian Marathon Championship" has been registered in New South Wales and Victoria as a business name.
4. Office accommodation - Olympic Park. The matter of telephone installation costs is still to be resolved. If this matter is settled the Union office should move to Olympic Park after Easter.
Details: Cost - \$5,000 per annum
- 2 areas available; one for office, one for storage.
- area carpeted and partitioned,
- separate air conditioning unit and heating unit to be installed
5. The historical records of the Union have been collected from Mr. Hodsdon and are presently housed at Olympic Park. Miss Neville and Messrs. Gardiner & Schubert have offered to sort and file all material.
6. Minute 2.1.4 of the 20th Meeting of the Board.
Eligibility of Gael Mulhall to compete domestically.
7. World Cup Application.
A submission for funds to upgrade the Stadium and provide a synthetic warm-up track has been put to Cabinet. The matter has yet to be resolved however the Board has agreed that should the funds not be forthcoming, the application to stage World Cup IV will be withdrawn.
8. Australia vs. New Zealand Schools Track & Field Match.
A suggestion has been received from the New Zealand Schools Associations re the above.
Team members would have to meet their own travel expenses and New Zealand would billet them as was done this year.
A problem occurs with the date of the Championships and it may be necessary to change the date of the Australian Schools Championships to enable the selection of the team.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY TO THE 1982

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR (Appendix 4)

Sponsorship:

Sanyo - The sponsorship by Sanyo of the Australian Track & Field Championships, and their donation of video packs to Member Associations was very welcome this year.

The port-a-pak units will be invaluable to Associations' coaching programmes and I am sure that should all go well at the Championships, there could be a possibility of Sanyo extending their sponsorship.

Sanyo has expressed a wish that local offices get further involved with athletics on a State basis and it therefore remains with Member Associations to take advantage of this offer.

Comsteel - The Commonwealth Steel Company agreed mid-1981 to sponsor the All Schools Track & Field Championships for 1982, 1983 & 1984 for a total of \$66,000.

Performances at the 1981 Championships were excellent and the competition very keen. Some problems were experienced with the organisation which I am sure will not occur in the future.

Mars - The 5 Star Award continued to be promoted in South Australia, Victoria, New South Wales and Tasmania. New South Wales appear to be the only Association actively promoting the scheme. It is incumbent upon all Associations involved to promote the project through schools as it is athletics' major development and promotional programme in Australia.

Western Australian has been invited to participate from the commencement of 1982. No reply to their invitation has been received to date. It is planned to commence the scheme in Queensland in late 1983.

Cloth badges will be available for sale later this year. It is hoped this part of the scheme will produce funds for both Member Associations and the Union.

Shell - The Shell Company of Australia continue to be a loyal and very supportive sponsor of athletics in Australia and all Member Associations are urged to acknowledge their involvement wherever possible.

Alcoa - The National Squad programme was modified last year to cater for the current needs of athletes. The Alcoa Challenge Series took a different form following suggestions and requests from the elite athletes.

Alcoa support for athletics presently is planned to cover the period up to the end of 1982. Alcoa's contribution to Australian athletics has given us the opportunity to implement most of our ideas and plans for coaching of athletes in Australia. The test of its' value will be with the results at the Commonwealth Games.

I know all in Australian athletics appreciate Alcoa's support over the past 3 years and hope they will continue their involvement for some time to come.

Adidas - The agreement with Adidas concludes at the end of this season.

All teams have been adequately equipped over the past year and I am grateful to Adidas for their co-operation in the equipping of teams.

Ansett - Ansett has declined to assist the Union in any way over the the past 12 months. The decision has resulted in a re-assessment of all travel by the Union with the result of a 40% drop in air travel from the previous year.

MB Travel - Case Muskens and the staff of MB Travel have been most co-operative over the past 12 months and I am most grateful for their help and advice throughout the year.

2. Publications:

Almanac - The Almanac still retains its' value and interest. All Clubs now receive complimentary copies via Member Associations.

Media Digest - This booklet is produced by Alcoa and is an invaluable reference for the media. All information for this publication is supplied by the athletes and collated and typed in the office.

AAU News - Although this publication is an expense to the Union at present, it remains a vital link between the National Association and the athletes and coaches.

The magazine's function is to disseminate material a little quicker than it would normally take as well as give the Board, the Coaching Director and myself an avenue of communication.

The AAU News would not exist if it was not for the enormous amount of time editor Bill Earle spends on collating and pasting up the material. Thanks also goes to Lil Neville and Henri Schubert for their regular help in processing the distribution of the magazine.

The magazine currently faces two problems:

1. Finance - it is suggested that Associations look at including a copy of AAU News in their subscription. This has been suggested before and can be achieved for a cost of \$4.00 per year.
2. Local correspondents - it would be most helpful if States could find a willing person to collate information on a State level and forward it to the editor for inclusion in the magazine.

All Time Lists - It is planned to produce a booklet with a 100 deep all time ranking list in the coming year. Paul Jenes and friends have spent many hours collating this material which should be of great interest to all athletic followers.

The book will also contain a complete list of all Australian athletes at Olympic and Commonwealth Games, including performances.

4. Competition:

Alcoa Challenge Series:

The Alcoa Challenge Series concept was changed for season 1981-82.

The series was shortened to three meetings and funds were used to bring a number of international athletes to Australia for the Series. The aspect satisfied two areas of concern:

1. the athletes requested international competition and this was provided in ten events;
2. the need to promote amateur athletics at this level.

An agreement was reached with Global Sports Promotions who undertook to arrange for the appearance of all international athletes and underwrite all costs. As we had not worked together before a number of minor problems arose relating to the organisation of the Series which have already been resolved and which will not occur in the future.

The Series was disappointing in as much that attendance in Adelaide and Sydney was nowhere the numbers anticipated. Publicity in Adelaide was excellent whereas Sydney publicity was not as extensive as Adelaide or Melbourne. This was notwithstanding similar efforts being made in all States in this area. One reason for a shortfall in attendances in Sydney and Adelaide was the weather - wet Sydney, extremely hot Adelaide.

The Melbourne meeting was well attended (8,900) and the organisation and conduct of the meeting was of a very high standard.

Performances at all meets were good with numerous State records broken and a number of Australian records. Both Australian and international athletes were most co-operative in respect to publicity and their conduct at the meeting.

The television coverage of the meetings was not as extensive or as long as originally agreed upon with the network concerned. Notwithstanding these two factors, the coverage did highlight athletics over these eight days and was a positive and constructive promotion of athletics nationally.

REPORT OF THE COACHING DIRECTOR TO THE 1982 ANNUAL CONGRESS

The following is a summary of my coaching and related activities since September 1981.

The National Event Coaches submitted their plans for assistance to members of the 1982 Alcoa National Squad.
 - (c) Sent letters to all Alcoa National Squad members listing criteria for selection in the Australian Touring Team for 1982.
 - (d) Sent letters to all Multiple Event Squad members on Selection criteria for Australian Team to compete in New Zealand.
 - (e) Sent letters to the All-Australia Schools Team congratulating them on their selection, offering assistance and informing them of their one year's free subscription to the "A.A.U. News".

PROPOSED ALCOA NATIONAL SQUAD COACHING PROGRAMME 1982

Following the Australian Championships, the Alcoa National Squad be Selected in "A", "B" and "C" Divisions. The National Event Coaches will submit their recommendations to the National Coaching Director by the end of March. She will then meet with the members of the A.A.U. Selection Committee and if any changes are recommended, a discussion will take place between the National Event Coach concerned and the Chairman of Selectors, to reach an agreement.

In this Commonwealth Games year, emphasis will be placed on assisting members of the "A" and "B" Squads.

Amount available - \$35,00.00 (less \$1,000.00 already spent on National Event Coaches' Meeting - air fares).

The National Event Coaches identified the following forms of assistance for the "A" and "B" Squad athletes. It is important to note that not all coaches wanted the same things and that none of them wanted all of these features - they were very aware of the financial limitations.

(a) Direct Contact

National Event Coach visits athletes and personal coaches, attends trials and major meetings. Coaches need fares and accommodation provided.

(b) Financial assistance to athletes

For example, assistance with fares to the Trials, medical expenses, living expenses (buying time to train).

(c) Training camp in a warm climate - Brisbane or Sydney in August. For those top athletes who do not compete in Europe and who live in southern states it is important to be in a warm climate for a period in August to train and compete.(d) Athletes' fares and accommodation to train with other athletes

This applies to relay teams in particular but also to some other events where leading athletes are centred in one state and one or two others would gain great benefit by flying in to train with them and the National Event Coach for several weekends during the year.

(e) Pre-trials competition during August.


Top athletes not going away to Europe may require fares to another state in order to get competition before the trials.

(f) Postage and duplication costs by the National Event Coach.(g) Telephone contact by the National Event Coach.

"C" Squad athletes

It is proposed that each National Event Coach will contact the members of his or her "C" Squad by mail following their selection, offer assistance, supply his or her telephone number and address, outline a recommended conditioning programme, provide a t-shirt and inform the athlete of his or her free subscription to the "A.A.U. News" for one year.

Those National Event Coaches who require direct contact with members of the "A" and "B" Squad will also contact members of the "C" Squad when they visit other capital cities. "C" Squad athletes residing in the same city as the National Event Coach will be contacted personally.
